DISCOVER STATEN ISLAND – THE GREENEST BOROUGH – WITH DAVID HARTMAN AND BARRY LEWIS IN THEIR LATEST VIDEO WALKING TOUR ON THIRTEEN/WNET NEW YORK

A WALK AROUND STATEN ISLAND WITH DAVID HARTMAN AND BARRY LEWIS
Completes Initial Cycle of Travel Programs Exploring All Five New York City Boroughs And Beyond

David Hartman, the former co-anchor of *Good Morning America*, and historian Barry Lewis enjoyed a ride on the Staten Island Ferry, just as thousands of tourists do every year. But when they reached the terminal at St. George, they did what most other visitors don't. They left the ferry terminal and visited Staten Island.

With ***A WALK AROUND STATEN ISLAND WITH DAVID HARTMAN AND BARRY LEWIS***, a 60-minute special premiering Monday, December 3, 9:30 p.m., Thirteen/WNET New York's popular Walking Tour series completes its first round of programs profiling the five boroughs of New York City. The series is hosted by Hartman, an award-winning documentary maker, and Lewis, a knowledgeable and engaging historian.

"Staten Island is an island not only geographically, but in spirit as well," said Hartman. "It is the least densely populated of New York City's five boroughs, arguably the greenest, and politically independent. But viewers will likely be impressed by Staten Island's diversity, rich history and numerous cultural attractions."

Lewis agrees. "What makes Staten Island so special is its people," he said. "In producing our program we've had the pleasure of meeting some of Staten Island's most interesting

personalities and discovered so much about this borough's history and heritage. I'm sure our viewers will enjoy discovering Staten Island and the people who bring vibrance to the community as well."

In ***A WALK AROUND STATEN ISLAND***, upon landing at St. George, Staten Island's gateway community, Hartman and Lewis find the beaux arts Borough Hall with its Frederick Charles Stahr murals of Staten Island history, the restored St. George Theatre (a baroque movie palace/vaudeville house), and the waterfront Richmond County Saving Bank Ballpark (home to the Staten Island Yankees). From there, they explore places and people, flavors and history all the way to the Conference House in Tottenville, where Benjamin Franklin and other members of the Continental Congress met in 1775 with Britain's Sir William Howe in an unsuccessful attempt to prevent the Revolutionary War.

Stops along the way include a 19th century sailor's retirement community-turned arts center, one of the nation's oldest free black communities, sandy beaches, unspoiled nature, a Greek revival mansion that recalls Tara, the near-ruins of an unusual hospital complex, the home of a famous Italian patriot and his housemate – the less famous inventor of the telephone – and the former world's largest garbage dump and future parkland. Viewers meet Staten Islanders who tell their local history, learn the continuing immigrant story, and find some of the Island's best pizza.

The program marks the 11th installment of Thirteen's popular Walking Tour series. Launched in 1998, the series features episodes that tour all five boroughs of New York City, in addition to New Jersey, including *A Walk Through the Bronx*, *A Walk Through Central Park*, *A Walk In Greenwich Village*, *A Walk Around Brooklyn*, *A Walk Through Harlem*, *A Walk Up Broadway*, *A Walk Through Newark*, *A Walk Through Hoboken*, *A Walk Through Queens*, and *A Walk Down 42nd Street*.

A WALK AROUND STATEN ISLAND WITH DAVID HARTMAN AND BARRY LEWIS is a production of Thirteen/WNET New York. James Nicoloro is senior producer. John

DeNatale is executive producer. Suzanne Glickstein is co-producer. Tamara E. Robinson, Thirteen's vice president for programming, is executive in charge.
